Jordan's Principle (JP) Hub Website RFP Closes March 23, 2021

Introduction

The BC Aboriginal Child Care Society (BCACCS) is committed to nurturing excellence through community outreach, education and training, research and advocacy, to ensure every Indigenous child in BC has access to spiritually enriching, culturally based, high quality early learning and child care services. Our office is located in West Vancouver, BC.

BCACCS is accepting proposals to:

- 1) Design a website for the Jordan's Principle Provincial Service Hub. This is a new project that provides a platform with both public facing and backend "secure member only" access, an integrated training component, and will follow federal communications policy as needed;
- 2) engage with relevant audiences to understand their needs;
- 3) design products to be included on the website (e.g. info sheets, FAQs);
- 4) create copy to be included on the website;
- 5) create a procedure manual and style guide specific to the website maintenance;

- 6) set-up domain and hosting; and
- 7) provide recommendations for software and processes for collaboration for working across the province.

Context

This will be a concept to completion project. The anticipated deadline is to have wire frame design complete by May 21, 2021 and soft launch of completed site by June 21, 2021. The focus is on having a website that helps connect people to people, people to services, people to information and resources, people to training and development, and people to advocacy.

Bear Witness Day

May 10 is Spirit Bear's birthday and an important date in the history of Jordan's Principle at the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal. The Tribunal's first non-compliance order called for Canada to fully implement Jordan's Principle by May 10, 2016. Unfortunately, it took several more years and many non-compliance orders (September 2016, May 2017, November 2017) against Canada before any real progress was made.

Jordan's Principle (www.jordansprinciple.ca) is a child first principle and legal rule named in memory of Jordan River Anderson. It ensures First Nations children receive the services and supports they need when they need them.

Show your support and "Bear Witness" to ensure Jordan's Principle is fully implemented. Here are some COVID-19 safe things you can do at home:

Take part in the online screening of Spirit Bear and Children Make History!

Hang out with your bears or favourite stuffed animal at home! Ask loved ones in your home to participate too! You can let your neighbours know that you are participating in Bear Witness Day by placing your teddy bear or a drawing of a bear in the window.

Host an online teddy bear tea party or bear birthday party to honour Jordan River Anderson and to learn about Jordan's Principle.



The First Nations Pedagogies Network (FNPN) is dedicated to cultural continuance and revitalization in early childhood education with First Nations children, families, cultures and communities on Indigenous terms. They have just launched their new website. Visit https://fnpn.ca/ to find out more.

Hosted by the BC Aboriginal Child Care Society (BCACCS) and building on an opportunity to work within the Early Childhood Pedagogy Network (ECPN)—as its inaugural Indigenous Stream—the FNPN is a unique program of support, creation and sharing of distinctly First Nations ways of supporting children, families, cultures and communities.

From First Nations' strengths in early learning and child care (ELCC), the FNPN is helping to develop new ways to support and share resurgent and emerging practices while broadening conceptions of quality in Indigenous ELCC on First Nations terms.

Following the First Nations ELCC Framework, and in close partnership with the ECPN, the FNPN supports and brings together the work of First Nations equivalents of Pedagogists in the ECPN to work with each other, Indigenous Elders, First Nations early childhood education programs (those existing and those being created) and First Nations communities to realize, affirm, extend and secure distinctly First Nations promise and practice in ELCC.
